## campaign funds for security (CFS)



## what is CFS?

In 2024, the Federal Election Commission (FEC) issued a final rule change, clarifying that all federal candidates and officeholders, may use campaign funds to pay for security measures so long as the expenses address ongoing threats or dangers directly related to their public status. Permissible security expenses include, but are not limited to:

- Non-structural security devices
- Structural security devices
- · Security personnel
- Cybersecurity software, devices, and services

## CFS at the state level

10 states have enacted similar laws or rulings that allow candidates for state and local office to use campaign funds on security expenses. In states where CFS is allowed, security expenses can be used like any other allowable campaign expense as they relate to the duties of campaigning for public office.

If you are running for office in the following states, you can use campaign funds on security expenses:
